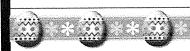

Everyday, I hear complaints about various neighborhoods and how bad they are, the crime is crazy and no one cares. I ask the question, "What have your neighbors said?" The normal response is "I haven't talked with the neighbors!". I have used the recipe below as an article for the newsletter and I believe it is time to dust it off and print it again. I have changed the title from "Recipe to Prevent Conflict Between Neighbors" to:

Recipe to be a Good Neighbor

Meet your neighbors—introduce yourself and learn your neighbor's names.

Keep your neighbors informed—contact them before doing something that might affect them—such as hosting a party.

Observe the Golden Rule—set an example by being a good neighbor yourself.

Be aware of differences—age, ethnic background, etc. Make an effort to talk with and understand each other. Diversity is a strength!

Consider your neighbors' point of view—how do the toys in your yard look from the neighbor's point of view—is it messy?

Be appreciative—if a neighbor does something you like, tell them.

Be positive—if your neighbor does something that irritates you, don't assume it was on purpose. Presume the neighbor does not know about the annoyance. Talk to them.

Be candid—if your neighbors do something that bothers you, let them know.

Be respectful—talk directly with the neighbor, don't gossip, don't feed on the rumors.

Be calm—listen carefully and thank them for telling you how they feel. Don't react defensively.

Listen well—try to understand how your neighbor feels.

Take your time—If you need to. Take a break to think about the conversation. Arrange to finish the discussion later.

A neighborhood is only as strong as its neighbors want it to be.
